The weekend got off to a flying start with music in the Square on Friday night and a well-attended Joggers Race on Bolberry Down on Saturday morning.

We managed to run all our usual programme of events on the beach from Yoga and Sandcastle Competitions and Dog Fancy Dress to Tug of War and Crazy Sports. Hope Cove Life Boat

We have just come to the end of our busiest period of the year, with an average of one 'shout' per week over the last couple of months, mostly due to the influx of visitors. The majority of calls were to Stand Up Paddle boards where people are not aware of the effects of wind and tide. They find themselves a long way off shore not making any progress to return, as they are on a falling tide with offshore wind pushing them out.

We believe that the ready availability and drop in price of SUPs has meant a lot of people take up the hobby but there is little or no guidance from manufacturers about safety.

We would recommend that the first thing people do is check the weather conditions and tides, wear buoyancy aids and carry phone/radio in a waterproof case. One of the side effects of the popularity of SUPs is that on several occasions we have rescued people who have lost a board. This then means an extensive search by the lifeboats. This is because if the board is if not found we then get reports of missing people when the board is spotted with no one on it. We have also been tasked to a report of a kayak with no occupants. After a wide search, the kayak was recovered and showed all the signs of not being used for some considerable time. We surmised that it had been washed down one of the local rivers due to the recent very high spring tide and a surge due to rainfall. We also took a couple of calls to boats with engine failures and once located we towed them back in.

It has been a good time for donations to help our funding. One was from the South Hams Hash House Harriers who all turned up at the Life Boat Station to present their cheque whilst on their run. Thank you all very much! We also had a very generous donation from an individual who saw on social media that we had a trolley jack failure when turning the boat round after a shout. Thank you very much for the speedy contribution. The other major cheque was from Kate Rhymes aka "Trixi" who ran a cocktail bar during the summer months on the plinth by the slipway on Tuesday evenings while we launched the boat for our regular training evening. This was supported by lots of people who could watch us in action while enjoying one of her delicious mixes. Thank you very much to Kate and her small team for all the work they put in and their generosity.

The regular weekly stall selling clothing etc was busy on the Harbour beach slip with a very high level of sales, this was manned by crew and their family and friends and makes us a steady income throughout the years. Thanks to them for their efforts.

I should also like to thank Becci Hay who is donating the proceeds from the sale of her amazing sunset picture 'A Sky full of Hope' which you can find on the Hope Cove Facebook page.

We have just signed off and filed the accounts for 2022 with the Charity Commission and doing some very simplistic sums, dividing total spend by the number of 'shouts' we worked out that the cost per 'shout' for that year was over £1,500.00.

Our next major spend will be to replace the launch 'tractor' unit which is suffering from severe salt water corrosion despite being given a thorough wash down after every launch. A small team of crew and trustees are currently exploring various solutions to try and come up with a more durable piece of equipment

that is within our budget.

We have just taken delivery of a £500.00 cradle stretcher to use on the boat if we have to pick up casualties from the beach or water. This was seen as a requirement after some incidents where we ended up having to borrow from the coastguards or the ambulance service. The crew are now training with it to ensure that they are familiar with techniques required to ensure the safety of the casualty.

You may have seen a lot of coastguards around Hope Cove a couple of weeks ago, this was part of a joint training exercise organised as part of our regular crew training and all parties agreed they benefitted from understanding how each team operates. This will be repeated in the future as we do have regular contact with other local teams.

South West Water will lift all hosepipe restrictions

These will be lifted across Devon and Cornwall from September 25

The company promised to review the restrictions in Colliford and Roadford water supply zones and says - thanks to the collaboration of customers - water resources are in a much more stable position following the peak summer demand. Roadford Reservoir is at 53 per cent storage, up 10 per cent from this time last year, while Colliford Reservoir is at 52% storage, up 28% from last year.

Attendance has been excellent and members heard at the recent AGM about how much the Club has progressed this year. All sections of membership are now FULL, i.e. Country Membership, Disabled Membership and Full membership. There is a waiting list of 114. Whilst there are demands for the creation of a Junior Membership section (I.e. those under 65 years of age) this has been resisted. This has caused slight resentment in some quarters, but, this is something we

have to live with, if, quite rightly, we are going to abide by our principles.

The catering section has excelled itself this year and all members were extremely complimentary following the recent Annual Dinner. Fund raising has reached a new peak, and in addition to donating to a host of needy charities there has still been enough to finance projects closer to home. Our Safeguarding Officer was able to attend the National Conference, a prominent visiting speaker thrilled all members with an illuminating lecture on diversity, but most of all, there is enough in the kitty to commence building changing facilities for club members on the beach. Looking ahead, plans for the 2024 'Limpopo Challenge' are well advanced and several national publications are keen to produce articles about us in addition to a major T.V. Station talking to us at length about a possible documentary. All hush hush at the moment, but watch this space.

The National Trust



We have had a successful Archaeological dig on the Bolt Tail Iron Age Promontory Fort as part of the Coastal Heritage Project. The partnership work with Historic England and the South Devon AONB team saw a week of excavations on the headland to further understand how this site was used historically, which will then feed into our management of this area to ensure the important features are protected. The volunteers worked throughout a range of weather conditions with professional archaeologists to excavate two trenches.

We also held an event as part of the Heritage Open Days on Saturday 16th in the Reading Rooms in Hope Cove with displays about the dig and guided walks with the Historic Environment Team from Devon County Council. Despite the wet weather this was really well attended and visitors really enjoyed learning about the site and the work of the project. We are waiting on the official report, but some finds were WW11 rifle shell cases, worked flints, signs of interconnecting walls from the Iron Age period and some medieval pottery. We will continue excavations on some other areas around the fort next year.

The wildflowers sown into Bolberry Down have taken well and will help increase the diversity of this meadow, some will take two years to flower so there should be even more next year.

Ranger Ricky and the volunteers have been replacing the rotten cleft chestnut fencing around the picnic benches at South Milton Sands and the rope around the café area so this is all looking very smart. We are also currently working on a bike rack to be installed opposite the café.

Scam Alert

Another email scam to look out for. This one tells you that you have won a million dollars in the latest 'WhatsApp Lottery' and is signed off "WhatsApp Administration". It asks you to click on the link to fill in further personal details so they can make the payment. So obviously a scam which, hopefully, people will not fall for but if you're on WhatsApp, as so many people are these days, you could possibly be fooled. You can report a suspicious email to the National Cyber Security Centre by forwarding it to report@phishing.gov.uk and you will receive an immediate acknowledgement. They will analyse the content of the suspicious email and seek to block the address it came from so it can no longer send emails. As of May this year they had received in excess of 20,995,000 reports with the removal of more than 129,000 scams. Prawle Point Coastwatch

We're pleased to report that we have 9 potential trainee watchkeepers who will be learning the ropes during the winter.

We've had a fair number of incidents this month. On 20th a yacht reported being fouled on fishing pots just South of Start Point. Falmouth Coastguard tasked Salcombe AWLB. As we

had visual of the casualty we monitored it and contacted our neighbouring station, Froward Point. A local fishing boat managed to free the pots and the yacht was able make way under sail into Dartmouth.

The next two days we heard PAN PANs on Ch16. One was from a local sea angling charter with 12 persons reporting engine failure. We had visual 2.2nm SW of the lookout, confirmed its position and state with FCG and maintained a monitoring watch until a local fishing boat responded and towed the casualty into Salcombe. The next was a yacht with engine failure 1nm SE of Start Point with 3 persons on board. We had visual and watched as a motor cruiser established a tow towards Salcombe. The cruiser had problems with coms and telephoned the lookout to request weather information, radio check and the channel number for Salcombe Harbour. We monitored the rescue until the boat was safely over the Bar.

On September 3rd a motor vessel reported engine failure off Bolt Head. The skipper was awaiting assistance from a fishing boat but we were provided information to FCG about the casualty's position. The vessel proceeded safely into Salcombe Harbour.

On September 17th we were telephoned by FCG. They were concerned about a Catamaran rounding Bolt Head very close to the shore, in a Force 8. We monitored the vessel and reported their safe crossing of the Bar to the coastguard.

Our monthly meeting was a fascinating talk by our very own Peter Sandover on his work with the Visually Impaired. He regularly takes his own yacht for a cruise with both sighted and blind crew. This year they sailed from Falmouth with 2 more sighted crew, including another of our watch-keepers, and 2 blind crew. The blind sailors are encouraged to get involved with every aspect of sailing and spend a lot of time helming the yacht very successfully.

Nature Notes

Well, well so many interesting things and so little space! Our reader will be thrilled to hear that NNI have opened a new office in Weymouth Park! Our local representative whom we will call 'J' for security reasons spotted hares in the fields behind her house; hares used to be not uncommon in Galmpton but in recent times they seem to have moved west. Also spotted on several occasions were geese—probably flying between the wetlands at Thurlestone and Hope Barton. Jan also saw a Hoopoe as indeed did J of Galmpton. I suspect it was the same one. Hoopoes are an occasional visitor; one was spotted last year by BG. This beautiful brightly coloured bird has an intriguing history venerated by the ancient Egyptians and cursed by many other cultures as being foul. We've been here before. BG also spotted some deer, again not uncommon but not often seen in such open ground. Roe deer we believe.

But the scoop of the month was the participation by J of Lower Galmpton in the great bat survey. Apparently this survey is conducted every year and this year yielded a bumper harvest of bat varieties. We are not a fan of lists, as all that it indicates is that one has nothing interesting to write about, but in this case we will make an exception and name a few of the 15 varieties in alphabetical order:- Barbastelle, Brandt's, Brown long-eared, Common Pipistrelle, Duabenton, Grey long eared, Lesser horse shoe, Natterer's, Noctule, Serotine, Soprano pipistrelle, whiskered—enough! You have to smile—those bat Duabenton, Grey long eared, Lesser horse shoe, Natterer's, Noctule, Serotine, Soprano pipistrelle, whiskered—enough! You have to smile—those bat people must eat out on the inventiveness of the names. I mean would you name your daughter Barbastelle or Noctule? Apparently there are 18 varieties / species of bats in England - so to record 15 here seems very exciting. Mind you three of the ones recorded were low confidence. Also recorded by the same equipment were bush crickets, a hazel dormouse, and various birds and moths. Not bad eh?

Speaking of moths SB of Inner Hope spotted a Humming Bird Hawk Moth; again not unknown but a very distinctive moth with a very long proboscis that allows it to gather nectar from the deepest of flowers. Proboscis—we love that word but seldom get a chance to use it.

J of Galmpton Green alerted the NNI team to a festival of red admiral butterflies which were feeding ravenously on flowering ivy. They were accompanied by numerous bees. What a sight and sound.

Other notable butterflies espied recently along with the red admirals were painted ladies and commas. Very beautiful, but we are missing the peacocks and tortoiseshells. Did you know many of these butterflies are migrants flying here from France and Spain? None arrive in small boats.


